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### **PERFORMERS**

**Kenan Oktay** is an emerging classical crossover singer. He will be graduating from Tufts University with a major in International Relations, and a minor in French. He began his singing journey in 2022 when he joined the Tufts Amalgamates a cappella group. He began studying voice as a novice with Bülent Güneralp in 2023. He joined the Tufts Opera Ensemble in the fall, and sang in the scenes program as Tamino in Die Zauberflöte by Mozart, Donkey in Shrek the Musical by Jeanine Tesori, Alidoro in La Cenerentola by Rossini, and in the ensemble of Sunday in the Park with George by Sondheim. He also sang as the title character in a Tufts Wind Ensemble concert of Candide by Bernstein. During his studies abroad, he sang in Paris at Sorbonne Nouvelle University's cabaret show, Sorbouche Nouvelle. He also auditioned for the 2024 Lanzarote Opera Festival and Academy. At the festival he sang opera, oratorio, art song and musical theater repertoire by Handel, Mozart, Verdi, Tchaikovsky, Fauré, and Bernstein. After returning to the US, upon the encouragement of Bülent Güneralp, he began developing his own voice studio. In the fall of 2024 he sang in the Tufts Opera Ensemble scenes program as Nemorino in *L'elisir d'amore* by Donizetti, and as Don Ramiro in *La Cenerentola*. He also sang in the ensembles of *Die Zauberflöte*, and *Little Shop of Horrors* by Menken. In his last semester at Tufts, he sang as the tenor choral scholar and section leader in the Tufts University Chaplaincy Choir. Most recently, he enacted the triple roles of King of the East, Moon, and Chorus 5 in the Opera Ensemble's production of *The Enchanted Pig* by Jonathan Dove. Kenan Oktay recently auditioned for, and enrolled in Longy School of Music in Cambridge, Massachusetts. He is looking forward to studying in the Graduate Performance Diploma in Voice program this fall. Further information can be found at www.kenanoktay.com.

**Thomas Stumpf** received his degrees in piano performance from the Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria, and the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston. His career has taken him to four continents, and his repertoire extends from the complete piano works of Mozart (which he performed in nine recitals at Boston University) to the premieres of many compositions by contemporary American composers. Stumpf is also a well-known collaborative pianist, and in that role, he has performed with Rita Streich, Edith Mathis, D'Anna Fortunato, Richard Stoltzman, Jack Brymer, Walter Trampler and Leslie Parnas, among many others. He has taught piano at the New England Conservatory, UMassLowell, and Boston University and is presently on the faculty of Tufts University. He has given masterclasses as solo and collaborative pianist at universities throughout the U.S., in Moscow and St. Petersburg, and in Germany and Switzerland.

He was Director of Music at Follen Church (Unitarian-Universalist) in Lexington MA, where he conducted choral repertoire ranging from Bach's Magnificat to the Mozart and Fauré Requiems to the Sacred Concerts of Duke Ellington. His experience at Follen led to his first book: a collection of essays entitled "A Sounding Mirror: Courage and Music in Our Time," published by Higganum Hill Books in 2005. He was also the cofounder and Artistic Director of Prism Opera, and conducted and directed Mozart's "La Clemenza di Tito" (in his own translation), as well as operas by Britten, Vaughan-Williams and Holst.

Stumpf's compositions have appeared on programs throughout the U.S. as well as in Russia and Germany. He won the Kahn Award for his music theater project "Dark Lady," one section of which was recorded by Joan Heller for the Albany label. Choral works of his have been performed in New York City by the Pharos Music Project by C4, and by the park Slope Singers; in Boston by the Master Singers, by Triad: Boston's Choral Collective, and by the Tufts University choirs; and by the Oberlin Womens' Chorale. Instrumentalists and singers who have performed his works include pianist John McDonald, cellist Emmanuel Feldman, violist Scott Woolweaver, saxophonist Philipp Stäudlin, and singers Pamela Murray and Lucy Dhegrae. His piano composition "The Spirit and the Dust" appears on his 2-CD solo album entitled "Reflections on Time and Mortality," which was issued on the Albany label in February 2017. This album also includes premiere recordings of works by Hayes Biggs, Gregory Brown, John McDonald, and Yehudi Wyner.
