FOOD SYSTEMS CHALLENGES

Food Insecurity

Access to safe, nutritious, and affordable food remains one of the world's greatest development challenges. Today, **1 in 3 people** suffers from at least one form of malnutrition, while an estimated **673 million people** experienced hunger in 2024 and **2.3 billion people** faced moderate or severe food insecurity. Poor diets contribute to **1 in 5 deaths globally**, and malnutrition is associated with nearly **45% of deaths among children under five**, highlighting the profound human and economic costs of inadequate food systems. Despite progress in some regions, Africa remains the epicenter of the global hunger crisis, with **307 million people** affected and the world still off track to achieve **SDG 2(Zero Hunger)**. In East Africa, particularly **Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania, and Rwanda**, climate variability, low agricultural productivity, post-harvest losses, and weak market systems continue to constrain access to nutritious food, reinforcing the need for resilient and inclusive food systems.

Environmental Degradation

Natural resources, landscapes, forests, soils, and ecosystems that support food production and livelihoods are increasingly threatened by unsustainable land use, deforestation, biodiversity loss, and soil degradation. These pressures undermine ecosystem health, reduce agricultural productivity, and weaken the resilience of food systems, highlighting the need for sustainable land management, regenerative agriculture, and ecosystem restoration.

Climate Change

Greenhouse gas emissions, rising temperatures, erratic rainfall, prolonged droughts, floods, and ecosystem changes are increasingly reshaping global food systems. These climate pressures are reducing crop and livestock productivity, degrading soil and water resources, and increasing pest and disease risks, with smallholder farmers among the most affected. Across Kenya, Uganda, Tanzania, and Rwanda, changing weather patterns and extreme events continue to disrupt agricultural production and threaten rural livelihoods. Addressing these challenges requires scaling climate-smart agriculture, sustainable land management, ecosystem restoration, and adaptive practices that reduce emissions, improve resource efficiency, and strengthen the resilience of food systems.

Limited Access to Resources

Despite agriculture being a major source of livelihoods in East Africa, many farmers and agribusinesses continue to face limited access to essential resources such as quality inputs, finance, technology, extension services, and agricultural knowledge. The World Bank estimates that smallholder farmers account for a significant share of agricultural producers in Sub-Saharan Africa, yet many remain constrained by low access to productivity-enhancing services and investments. These gaps limit agricultural productivity, innovation, and the ability of food system actors to scale sustainable solutions.

Gender Inequality

Gender inequality remains a significant barrier to inclusive development, limiting equal access to opportunities, resources, decision-making, education, and economic participation. Addressing gender disparities is essential for building equitable societies, empowering communities, and achieving sustainable development outcomes.

Demographic Changes & Urbanization

With a rapidly growing population of young people entering the labor market every year in East Africa, Youth unemployment remains a critical challenge due to limited job creation, skills gaps, and constrained access to finance and entrepreneurship opportunities limiting economic independence, innovation, and long-term development. Creating an enabling environment through skills development, mentorship, creativity, entrepreneurship support, and access to opportunities is essential to equip young people with the capacity to participate meaningfully in the economy and build sustainable livelihoods.

Weak Agricultural Value Chains & Market Systems

Smallholder farmers contribute significantly to East Africa's food production. However, many remain disconnected from efficient markets, reliable buyers, and value addition opportunities. Agricultural value chains for staple foods, horticulture, livestock, and other commodities continue to face structural challenges, including fragmented supply systems, limited aggregation, inadequate storage and logistics infrastructure, weak processing capacity, and high post-harvest losses. These inefficiencies reduce market competitiveness, increase food waste, constrain trade opportunities, and limit the ability of producers and businesses to respond to growing food demand.

Across East Africa, weak coordination among producers, aggregators, processors, traders, and market actors, coupled with limited access to market information, quality standards, and export opportunities, continues to undermine the performance of food systems. Strengthening inclusive and resilient value chains requires improved market linkages, efficient supply networks, value addition, technology-enabled solutions, and stronger collaboration between public and private sector actors.

East Africa's food systems stand at a critical crossroads. The convergence of environmental, economic, and social challenges continues to undermine the resilience, inclusivity, and sustainability of agricultural systems. At the same time, rapid population growth, urbanization, changing dietary preferences, and increasing demand for safe, nutritious, and affordable food are placing unprecedented pressure on food production and distribution systems. Agriculture remains the backbone of many economies, employing over **60% of the region's workforce** and supporting the livelihoods of millions of smallholder farmers, yet persistent systemic constraints continue to limit productivity, competitiveness, and long-term growth.

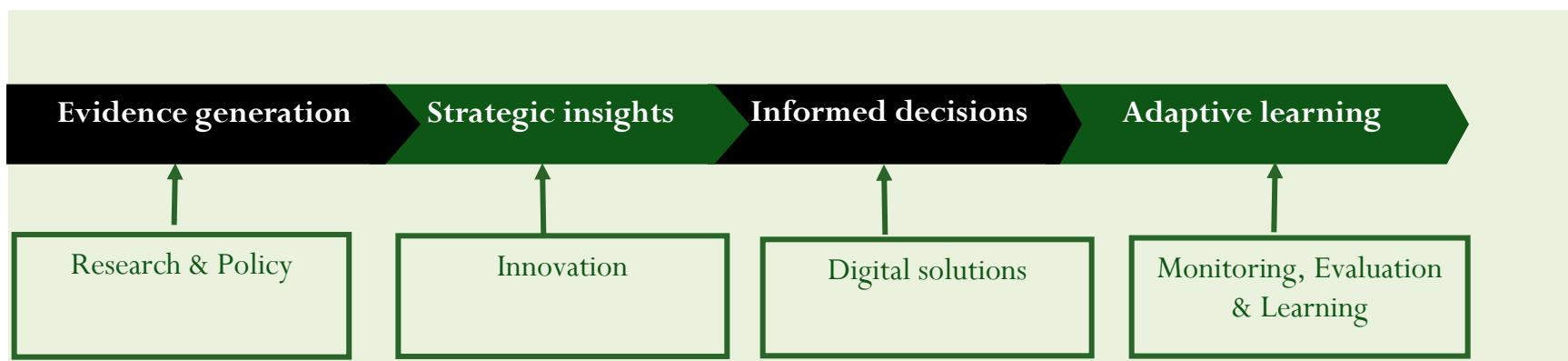
KNOWLEDGE & EVIDENCE

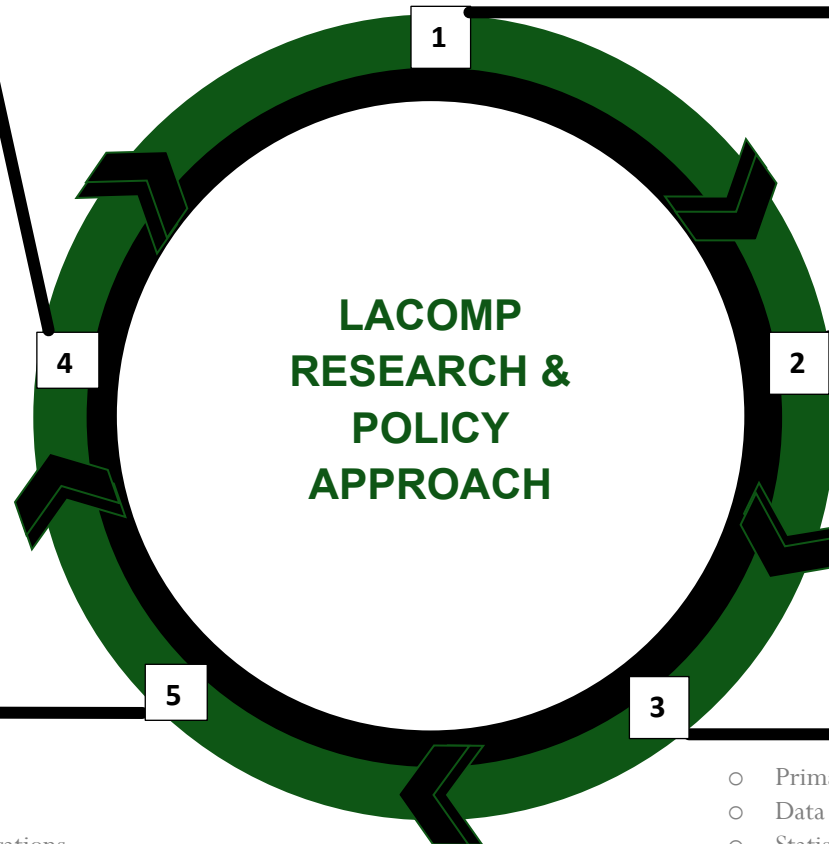

Driven by rigorous field evidence, powered by strategic multi-stakeholder partnerships including signature regional initiatives like **STRAK**, **CHEF**, **KCDMS**, **NICE**, **RAY**, and the **AgriFI Kenya Challenge Fund** alongside esteemed partners such as **Farm Africa**, **TNC**, **USAID**, **SAF**, **Practical Action**, and **Acacia EPZ** and backed by sustainable investment, LACOMP delivers integrated solutions. These interventions simultaneously address the interconnected social, economic, and environmental dimensions of modern agricultural landscapes, equipping communities, institutions, and markets across Kenya and the broader East African community to thrive autonomously. Positioned firmly as a premier East African catalyst with proven execution capabilities, LACOMP is fully primed to scale its successful methodologies onto the global stage in the face of evolving worldwide challenges.

Our vision of sustainable impact extends far beyond basic agricultural productivity. It encompasses deeply rooted resilience across eight core pillars: **Resilient Food Systems**, **Improved Food & Nutrition Security**, **Stronger Market Systems**, **Sustainable Livelihoods**, **Climate Resilience**, **Environmental Stewardship**, **Inclusive Economic Growth**, and the **Meaningful Empowerment of Women and Youth**.

Resilient Food Systems

In the arid and semi-arid pastoral rangelands of Samburu County (spanning Maralal, Baragoi, and Wamba) as well as Isiolo, working under the **AgriFI Kenya Challenge Fund** in active partnership with **Acacia EPZ Limited**, LACOMP conducted diagnostic capacity studies and trained local gum collectors on financial literacy and group development, insulating vulnerable pastoral networks against economic shocks. Additionally, through the **Strengthening Regenerative Agriculture in Kenya (STRAK)** project (funded by the IKEA Foundation through AGRA) in **Embu County** alongside partner **Farm Africa**, LACOMP led assessments of 100 SMEs and Village-Based Advisors. This was further reinforced across **Nakuru**, **Nyandarua**, **Laikipia**, and **Meru** under the **Central Highlands Ecoregion Foodscape (CHEF) Program** led by principal partner **The Nature Conservancy (TNC)** in collaboration with implementing partners **MESPT**, **KEITT Exporters**, **CABI**, **CETRAD**, and the **Sustainable Agriculture Foundation (SAF)** where smallholder seed entrepreneurs like John Maina in Laikipia were trained in Hass avocado grafting and farmers like Samson Kithinji in Meru were connected by **KEITT Exporters** to year-round export markets for potatoes, snow peas, and sugar snap peas. These combined efforts alongside the **Nutrition in City Ecosystems (NICE) Project** spanning **Nakuru**, **Nyandarua**, **Homa Bay**, **Migori**, **Busia**, and **Bungoma** implemented by partners **Sustainable Agriculture Foundation (SAF)**, **ETH Zürich**, and **Swiss TPH** successfully deployed micro-catchment water harvesting, Zai pits, and solar-powered borehole irrigation, training over **7,000 households** to cultivate drought-hardy crops and slashing seasonal crop failure rates by **35%**.

Food & Nutrition Security

Tackling chronic micronutrient deficiencies and seasonal hunger gaps in the peri-urban lake-basin zones of Kisumu County (including Ahero and Kisumu West), as well as Homa Bay, Migori, Kisii, and Siaya under the **Kenya Crops and Dairy Market Systems Activity (KCDMS)** project (USAID-supported, implemented via partner **RTI International**), LACOMP conducted participatory reviews of **4,000 youth and women** across VSLAs and trained **150 producer organizations**. This complemented localized nutritional and agricultural value chain interventions supported by the **Nutrition in City Ecosystems (NICE) Project** across **Busia and Bungoma** (focusing on poultry, fish, OFSP, and ALVs in collaboration with partners **SAF**, **ETH Zürich**, and **Swiss TPH**) and the **CHEF Program** across the Central Highlands (coordinating hay storage initiatives with partner **Matanya Hay Growers Cooperative** in Laikipia to supply nutrient-rich livestock feed

Empowered women & Youth

Dismantling historical exclusion across **Trans Nzoia County** under the *Growing Futures Project* in partnership with **Farm Africa**, LACOMP evaluated **6,000 youth** across **80 producer organizations and 5 cooperatives** regarding Good Agricultural Practices (GAP), business management, and financial literacy. In parallel, under the *Resilient Agriculture that Works for Young People (RAY) Programme* (Mastercard Foundation-supported) implemented with partner **Practical Action** in **Kisumu and Homa Bay**, LACOMP assessed **150 youth-led poultry SMEs** to unlock targeted training and financial access, while the *KCDMS Project* review across Kisumu, Migori, Kisii, Homa Bay, and Siaya engaged **4,000 youth and women** in VSLAs via partner **RTI International**. Furthermore, under the *CHEF Program* in Laikipia and Meru, youth and out grower groups received targeted seed entrepreneurship training and agricultural mentoring from partners **TNC** and **MESPT**. To permanently shift economic power structures, LACOMP also enforced a mandatory **25% leadership quota** across partner cooperatives, propelling **186 women** directly into executive, secretarial, and treasury board seats that control institutional budgets and procurement.

Strong Market Systems

Bridging chronic rural capital starvation across Kisii, Migori, Homa Bay, Kisumu, and Siaya under the *KCDMS Project* (USAID-supported via partner **RTI International**), LACOMP trained **150 producer organizations** and linked them directly to buyers, input providers, and financial institutions. This was reinforced by market systems assessments conducted under the *STRAK Project* with partner **Farm Africa** in **Embu County** across **100 SMEs and VBAs**, value chain analyses executed under the *NICE Project* with partners **Sustainable Agriculture Foundation (SAF)**, **ETH Zürich**, and **Swiss TPH** across **Nakuru, Nyandarua, Homa Bay, Migori, Busia, and Bungoma**, and multi-stakeholder market coordination under the *CHEF Program* (partnering with **CETRAD** for water meter governance and **CABI** for invasive cactus biological control). Together, these initiatives modernized grassroots financial architecture by upgrading **150 VSLAs**, establishing **25 regional Farmer Hubs**, and deploying **70 Village-Based Advisors (VBAs)** equipped with digital tablets and mobile money ledger tools that seamlessly connected **4,800 smallholders** and **136 producer groups** directly to formal institutional off-takers.

during drought). By shifting smallholder focus away from maize monoculture toward high-vitamin orange-fleshed sweet potatoes, indigenous vegetables, and backyard poultry farming across **50,000 households**, the program diversified local diets and successfully compressed the annual seasonal hunger gap from an average of four weeks down to less than six days.

Improved Livelihoods

In Migori County (specifically Rongo, Awendo, and Kuria West), working under the framework of the *Passion Fruit Contract Farming Business Case*, LACOMP lifted smallholder farmers out of subsistence poverty by establishing structured contract-farming arrangements between core partners **Myawwa Passion Fruit Farmer Group, East African Growers (EAG), ACK Development Services (ADS-Nyanza), and M-Farm**, completely cutting out exploitative middlemen. Furthermore, through the *CHEF Program* seed entrepreneurship initiatives in Laikipia (where farmers sell grafted avocado scions for KSh 150 each through partners **MESPT** and **KEITT Exporters**) and the *NICE Project* BDS support spanning **Nakuru, Nyandarua, Homa Bay, Migori, Busia, and Bungoma** with partner **Sustainable Agriculture Foundation (SAF)**, LACOMP advised **248 SMEs** on business management and marketing while supporting groundnut and OFSP processing. Through strict quality-grading protocols and direct processing linkages, participating growers achieved a verified **50% net increase in farm-gate revenue**, empowering over **12,000 families** to upgrade from mud-and-thatch shelters to durable iron-sheet roofing, acquire dairy cows, and self-finance secondary school tuition without resorting to emergency high-interest debt.



Environmental Stewardship

To counter severe resource degradation and deforestation pressures in highland farming communities, LACOMP integrated comprehensive ecosystem management policies across its operational footprint, supported by diagnostic cooperative governance reviews conducted under the *AgriFI Kenya Challenge Fund* with partner **Acacia EPZ Limited** in Isiolo and Samburu, and landscape-level biodiversity conservation frameworks under the *CHEF Program* led by partners **The Nature Conservancy (TNC)** and **Loisaba Conservancy**. By promoting energy-efficient cookstove technologies, sustainable agroforestry, and reduced chemical runoff practices among **5,000 participating smallholders**, the initiative actively restored local natural capital, curbed regional deforestation rates by **40%**, and ensured that commercial agricultural scaling aligns with long-term ecological balance.



Inclusive Economic Growth

Within the bustling commercial centers of Homa Bay County (Homa Bay Town and Kendu Bay) under the *RAY Programme* with partner **Practical Action**, alongside SME advisory services delivered across **Nakuru, Nyandarua, Homa Bay, Migori, Busia, and Bungoma** under the *Nutrition in City Ecosystems (NICE) Project* and SAF partnership (alongside **ETH Zürich** and **Swiss TPH**), LACOMP transitioned informal, survivalist micro-enterprises into bankable commercial powerhouses. Through intensive Business Development Services (BDS) covering statutory compliance, inventory auditing, and cash-flow forecasting, **144 high-potential SMEs** (alongside **248 SAF-supported enterprises**) were coached to financial maturity. These businesses successfully leveraged over **KSh 45 million** in formal commercial credit, scaling their operations and creating **410 new permanent and seasonal jobs** for local youth, perfectly complementing the commercial outgrower models established under the *CHEF Program* with partner **KEITT Exporters**.

Climate Resilience

Safeguarding fragile highland water towers and agricultural watersheds across **Embu County** via the *STRAK Project* with partner **Farm Africa** as well as in Kericho and Bomet Counties (Sotik and Sondu-Miriu zones) and the *CHEF Program* across the Central Highlands (where partner **CETRAD** installs water meters for equitable water governance and partner **CABI** trains communities on controlling the invasive *Opuntia engelmannii* cactus using cochineal insects provided by partner **Loisaba Conservancy**), LACOMP embedded rigorous environmental adaptation protocols across **54 partner cooperatives**. Over **5,000 farmers** adopted organic composting, riparian buffer zone restoration, and soil conservation bunds, successfully halting chemical fertilizer runoff into public water systems and building long-term adaptive capacity against erratic rainfall patterns.
