Foreword

Transformations are at the core of moving towards a more sustainable and just society. But they often create friction: The transformation to sustainable energy production, for example, leaves former coal mining areas in search for new perspectives. Conflicts between different societal actors are therefore often an impediment to meaningful change. Yet they are also catalysers of change and deeper mutual understanding.

During our three-day retreat in Mücheln, ten active members of the BAN Science Cluster came together to jointly learn about conflict resolution approaches and their application in current sustainability transformations. With Mücheln and the Geiseltalsee, we were situated in a region that has undergone a major transformation, reinventing itself as a green recreation and tourism area after a century-old tradition of coal mining came to an end.

With this documentation, we want to provide a few glimpses of our retreat and share learnings as well as ideas how to continue the cocreative process of knowledge generation in the science cluster. We hope to see many more formats evolve to foster further collaboration in the Science Cluster.

Co-creative Visioning

Bringing forward sustainability transitions begins with asking who are the stakeholders that should be included? And for what specific purpose? We can then build a first vision of the desired transition based on our understanding of the concepts, expectations, and different interests.

Several tools exist for defining a vision: back-casting, drivers analysis, horizon scanning and relevance trees, among others.

Some of these methods were presented at the workshop and the groups then developed a concept for their case.

The energy transition from fossil-based electricity generation to renewables has been a highly debated societal project in Germany. Coal mining regions across the country have experienced massive protests, not only from climate activists but also from those affected by the structural changes. The input session described forms of local protests that successfully prevented a village from being lost to an open pit mine. The role of conflict as a catalyser for change was analysed and key actors and strategies were discussed.

Network Analysis of the Science Cluster

The Science and Research Cluster brings together a large number of BAN members from a wide number of countries and fields of work. At the same time, the ability of members to access the network in a way that leads to joint initiatives and exchange is often limited. That generated the idea to conduct a social network analysis project. Such a project can support members and cluster coordinators to have a better understanding of the way the network works. Within the Cluster retreat we held a focus group discussing how members joined the BAN, how they connect to other colleagues in the Science and Research Cluster, what motivates them to be engaged, how they see the cluster attending to their needs and aspirations, and how we could have more collaboration within the framework of the Cluster. The insights generated during the focus group will be integrated in a report which is going to be published in the next months.
