Motion to Vacate the Speaker

After months of catering to the most extreme, right-wing elements of his party, Kevin McCarthy was removed from his post as Speaker of the House. I remain dedicated to fulfilling my Constitutional responsibility to govern responsibly for the people of Illinois' Second Congressional District, and our entire nation.

Promoting Access to Broadband Act of 2023



I introduced the Promoting Access to Broadband Act of 2023 in the House of Representatives alongside Senator Dick Durbin, who introduced this legislation in the Senate. The legislation will make grants available to states to inform Medicaid enrollees, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) participants, and low-income residents of their potential eligibility for the Federal Communications Commission's (FCC) Lifeline program and Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP).

The Lifeline program and ACP provide free or low-cost wireless service and internet-capable devices to qualifying individuals. Affordable internet connection increases opportunities for education, employment, health access, and community building. The Promoting Access to Broadband Act of 2023 will provide states with resources to increase awareness of these programs amongst eligible populations and increase usage of the Lifeline program and ACP.

The Boards of Sertoma Centre, Inc. and New Star, Inc. announced today that they will merge the two organizations, effective October 3, 2023. After completing a thorough assessment of the organizations and receiving approval from state agencies, both boards agreed that combining resources will have a greater impact in serving individuals with intellectual/developmental disabilities and those living with mental illness.

Dan will be the President/CEO of the agency and Gus will remain as Executive Director until his eventual retirement. The new Sertoma Star Services board will consist of seven members from each agency's board. The new Leadership Team has been chosen and is finalizing other staff positions for the new organization.

Strick praised the boards and staff of both organizations for thoughtfully managing the merger discussions and for keeping the needs of the individuals the two agencies serve top of mind.

GRADUATE CERTIFICATE PROGRAM IN RESTORATIVE JUSTICE

at Governors State University

The Graduate Certificate Program in

Restorative Justice (CRJ) at Governors State University combines faculty expertise in restorative justice with a multidisciplinary approach to justice in theory and practice.

Students who complete this certificate– whether on its own or in conjunction with a master's degree program in Education, Criminal Justice, or Political & Social Justice Studies–build a philosophical foundation in justice, learn best practices of restorative justice, and apply their skills and training toward more effective work in their local communities.

Students will investigate a range of topics in the classroom and in the field, including restorative justice in legal, educational, urban, environmental, local, and global contexts.

Certificate Requirements

To fulfill the requirements for the Certificate in Restorative Justice, a student must complete 15-18 total credit hours, including 12 credits for required courses and 3-6 credits for elective courses, with a grade of C or better in each course:

Required Courses (12 Credit Hours)

- CJUS 6500: Restorative Justice Practices
- CJUS 8400: The Justice System and Community
- PSJS 6250: Community Justice
- PSJS 8150: Contemporary Theories of Social Justice

Elective Courses (3-6 Credit Hours)

- CJUS 6340: Restorative Justice in Education
- PSJS 6440: Environmental Justice
- PSJS 6650: Empowering Community

Admission Requirements

In addition to university **admissions requirements**, applicants to the Graduate Certificate in Restorative Justice (Program Code: RESJ.GR.CERT) must submit:

- 1. A letter of application, including a statement of personal interest in pursuing a Certificate in Restorative Justice. This statement should include the applicant's short- and long-term goals and how this certificate might help to achieve them.
- 2. At least one confidential letter of recommendation from a professional reference (current or former faculty members, current or former work supervisors, or community leaders) speaking to the applicant's interests and abilities relevant to the Certificate in Restorative Justice.

Prospective students not already enrolled in a GSU graduate program should submit a completed application by June 1 for full consideration (late applications will also be accepted). Additional material such as a scholarly writing sample may be requested by the admissions committee or submitted voluntarily by an applicant toward admission consideration. The admissions committee takes into consideration strong letters of recommendation from professional references that attest to the applicant's writing and communication skills and examples of their leadership ability.

<u>International students</u> interested in the Certificate in Restorative Justice should contact the <u>Office of</u> <u>International Services</u> for assistance with both university admission and US immigration documentation.

Students already enrolled in the Education, CJUS, PSJS, or other GSU graduate degree programs interested in pursuing the Certificate in Restorative Justice must simply meet with their academic advisor to formally indicate their interest in doing so.

Transfer Credits: providing that university policies regarding transfer of graduate credits are met, transfer credits will only be accepted for graduate courses taken at accredited institutions. At most six (6) hours of transferable credits can be put toward the Certificate in Restorative Justice.

Anew: Building Beyond Violence and Abuse has been a Safe from the Start agency for more than 14 years. Safe from the Start is funded by the Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority (ICJIA) dedicated to addressing and reducing trauma of exposure to violence in children from birth to five years. Anew provides counseling services free of charge and available in English and Spanish, for children and their families. We focus on the child's exposure to trauma through specialized therapeutic techniques. SAFE FROM THE START (SFS)

A State funded research based intervention program that began in January 2001. Anew joined this project in the third year of operations (2004). The program is funded by the Illinois Criminal Justice Information Authority (ICJIA).

THE GOAL

To develop, implement, and evaluate comprehensive and coordinated community based models to identify, assess and provide services to children ages 0 5, as well as to

their caregivers, who have been exposed to violence in their home and/or community.

THE IMPACT

624 children were referred to Anew SFS, assessed, and offered a range of services from July 1, 2004 to June 30, 2020.

THE STATS

The average child served at Anew was exposed to approximately six different risk factors. The top 5 highest percentage of risk factors include: single parent, unplanned pregnancy, father in jail, child having serious medical problems, poverty.

The symptoms most frequently reported by caregivers about their children were clinging behavior (55%), aggression towards siblings (55%), anxiety (44%), and fearfulness/phobias (44%).

Do you know where you are sleeping tonight? Need help?

Entry Point is a way for people experiencing homelessness or at risk of experiencing homelessness to get the help they need.



The Entry Point Call Center can connect you with a housing provider or homelessness prevention services such as housing problem-solving, legal services, eviction prevention, or financial assistance, if available.
